Ireland on the UN Security Council – WPS Focus

As we conclude the first four months of our two-year term, please see below a brief update on some aspects of Ireland's WPS-related work at the UN Security Council


• Informal Expert Group on WPS

As announced in our <u>St Brigid's day newsletter</u> Ireland has been <u>appointed</u> as co-chair of the UN Security's Council's Informal Expert Group (IEG) on WPS with Mexico. The IEG was established in 2016 to facilitate a more systematic approach to WPS within the Council's own work and enable greater oversight and coordination of implementation efforts. So far in 2021, the IEG has held meetings on South Sudan, Yemen, Libya and Mali. A summary of each IEG meeting and its recommendations are sent as an annex to a letter to the UN Secretary-General and published as a document of the Council; they are publicly available <u>here</u>.

Arria formula meeting on WPS

The Permanent Missions of Ireland and Mexico co-hosted an Arria formula meeting entitled "Call to Lead by Example: Ensuring the Full, Equal and Meaningful Participation of Women in UN-led Peace Processes". The discussion highlighted the urgent need for a renewed commitment from the UN and member states to ensure the participation of women in UN-led peace and political processes. The briefers were Ms. Rosemary DiCarlo, Under-Secretary-General with the Department of Political & Peacebuilding Affairs (DPPA); Ms. <u>Rasha Jarhum</u>, Founder and Director of the Peace Track Initiative from Yemen; Mr. Geir O Pedersen, Special Envoy of the Secretary General for Syria; and Ms. Bronagh Hinds, negotiator of the Good Friday Agreement and chief strategist of the Northern Ireland Women's Coalition. CRSV Open Debate

On the 14th April the UN Security Council held an Open Debate on conflict-related sexual violence (CRSV). Ambassador Byrne Nason called on the Council to meet its responsibilities through the use of sanctions against perpetrators; tackling impunity including via International Criminal Court referrals; and ensuring UN missions monitor and document CRSV. In recent weeks, Ireland has consistently raised concerns about conflict-related sexual violence in the Tigray region of Ethiopia and in other conflict-affected and fragile contexts at the Security Council. We have also been a strong voice on WPS issues more

broadly across country and thematic files. You can read our statements at the UN Security Council <u>here</u>.

The stigma of rape in war belongs **not to its victims but to its perpetrators**. The stories of survivors of sexual violence need to be told, and importantly, **truly heard**.

Generation Equality Forum (GEF)

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The Generation Equality Forum is convened by UN Women and hosted by the Government of France and the Government of Mexico to mark the 25th Anniversary of the Beijing Declaration and Platform for Action. The Forum comprises two main high-level events, which represent the culmination of over a year of thematic, regional and other global consultation processes. The first event was the Mexico City Forum which was hosted by the Government of Mexico from 29 March to 31 March. The second event will be a Summit of Heads of State and Government hosted in Paris from 30 June to 2 July.



In that context, in February 2021, Ireland cohosted a youth-led series of global dialogues entitled "Evidence and experience: Adolescent Girls' Education in the Generation Equality Forum" (recording here). The outcome document of the dialogues - the "Youth Communique for Adolescent Girls' Education in the Generation Equality Forum" - was finalised in March 2021. In line with that commitment Ireland is scaling up support for girls' education and empowerment under the Global Ireland initiative and A Better World, Ireland's policy for international development, including by investing a minimum of €250 million of Overseas Development Assistance in education over five years, with a strong focus on girls' education.

Ireland has recently joined the Board of the Generation Equality Forum's Compact on Women, Peace and Security and Humanitarian Action (WPS-HA) – a multi-stakeholder group

that will focus on driving forward the implementation of existing commitments on WPS and humanitarian action – and is one of five Member State members represented along with Namibia, Norway, Sierra Leone and UAE. As part of its role in the WPS-HA Compact, Ireland participates in the working group on women's meaningful participation in peace processes. During the Mexico City Forum, Minister of State Brophy participated in a thematic session on adolescent girls on 29 March and Minister Coveney delivered concluding remarks at an event on the WPS-HA Compact on 30 March.

The first Annual Report of Ireland's Third National Action (NAP) Plan on Women Peace and Security (WPS) was submitted to the Joint Oireachtas Committee on Foreign Affairs and Defence on 11 February 2021 and is available on our <u>DFA WPS website</u> and our intranet page.

The Oversight Group held a meeting on the 3 March 2021, which featured presentations on human trafficking from guest speakers, **Professor Siobhán Mullally**, Special Rapporteur on Trafficking in Persons, and **Detective Superintendent Derek Maguire**, Organised Prostitution Investigation Unit, Garda National Protective Services Bureau, An Garda Síochána.
