<u>'Lá Fhéile Bríde - St Brigid's Day'</u>

This year the Department of Foreign Affairs, Dublin, launched an open call to colleagues everywhere to participate in a global initiative to celebrate and acknowledge the creativity and achievements of Irish women, in the arts, science, business, politics and in countless other fields. St Brigid's Day has captured the imagination of Irish communities around the world with events taking place in 35 different cities.

Australia's Irish communities took up this call and the Embassy funded and attended a number of St Brigid's Day events.

The Ambassador and Carmel attended the St Brigid's Day celebration of the Irish Club, Canberra. The programme consisted of talks on five significant Irish women, a traditional music session and an Irish dancing display.

"Gradam Gaeilge Comhaltas Ceoltóirí Éireann" was presented to Angela Devlin wife of the late Barney Devlin, a dedicated Irish language activist.

Sill in Canberra, the Ambassador and Carmel were guests at the St Brigid's celebration of Cairde na hÉireann/Friends of Ireland. The event consisted of two guest speakers, Sr Jane Keogh and Dr Jean O'Riordan who spoke about strong Irish women role models and remembered the ethos of St Brigid looking after those in need especially the refugees. There was an impressive session of traditional music, singers in Irish and English and an excellent Irish dancing display. Both the Ambassador and DHOM Eamonn Robinson were called upon to sing a few tunes!

A novel element of the event was a St Brigid's cross making workshop.

In Melbourne, the Ambassador and Carmel attended the celebration of Brigidfest. The lunch was addressed by Hon. Gabrielle Williams MP., Victorian Government Minister.

In Brisbane, Harriet Sexton Morel attended the Queensland Irish Association's Thirty Second St Brigid's Day Dinner. Fiona Hodge of Orange Sky was the key note speaker.

<u>Visit by Governor-General of</u> <u>Australia and Mrs Hurley to the</u> <u>Embassy</u>

The Governor-General of the Commonwealth of Australia His Excellency General the Honourable David Hurley AC DSC (Retd) and Mrs Lynda Hurley.

Ambassador Ó Caollaí and Carmel were honoured to host their Excellencies to lunch at the Embassy Residence on 18 February. The Governor-General is proud of his Irish heritage which has been traced to Ballinspittle, County Cork. In the course of the lunch we discovered that Mrs Hurley also has family connections to Belfast! The Governor-General expressed particular regret at the impact of COVID-19 on Ireland.

On the steps of the Embassy upon departure Mrs Hurley sang a lovely rendition of "When Irish Eyes are Smiling".

<u>Pawel Strzelecki, Forgotten Polish</u> <u>Hero of An Gorta Mór</u>

Ambassador Ó Caollaí was invited by the festival organisers and the Polish Ambassador, to open an exhibition commemorating the work of Pawel Strzelecki, a celebrated explorer. Strzelecki later played a key role in saving thousands of Irish children from starvation during An Gorta Mór. The event in Tumburumba, New South Wales, was preceded by a plaque unveiling and was attended by members of the Polish community, a number of State and local politicians and members of the public. The exhibition was originally produced by the Polish Embassy Dublin and opened by Uachtarán na hÉireann, Michael D Higgins in Dublin in 2019. (Then Lord Mayor of Dublin and Mayor of Poznan unveiled a plaque to Strzelecki in Sackville Place, Dublin in 2015)

Presentation to Mr Martin O'Connor

In Melbourne on 12 April, 2021 Ambassador Ó Caollaí had the honour on behalf of Minister Simon Coveney TD, Minister for Foreign Affairs and Defence, of presenting Mr Martin O'Connor with Irish defence medals on behalf of his father Mr Thomas O'Connor (RIP).

Martin was presented with An Bonn Jadotville medal which honours the men of "A" Company, 35th Infantry Battalion in recognition of their courageous actions during the siege at Jadotville in September 1961 during the UN Peacekeeping operation in the Congo as well as being presented with The Unit Citation to A Company and the UN Peacekeeping medal.

The Ambassador read out a personal message from Minister Coveney T.D. This was a proud and emotional acknowledgement to Martin and his family.



A spotlight on Perth

Since 1997, the Claddagh Association has been a family away from home, supporting Irish people in Western Australia (WA) through the ups and downs of life. As our vice Chairperson, Peter McKenna says, "If you have a network, things are much easier to manage but there are a lot of families here who don't have that in the way that they do back home in Ireland. What I realised is that I could make a difference to other people's well-being at the time of a crisis situation".

Much of Claddagh's work is carried out by our dedicated, hardworking volunteers. Their strong commitment to Claddagh's work is inspired by an understanding of its importance. Sometimes that understanding comes from personal experience as was the case for our committee member Stephanie Upton.

"I volunteer at the Claddagh Association because in my time of need there were a group of volunteers who stepped in and helped me. My dad, Ned, passed away quite suddenly on a holiday to Perth ... and we were just like, "What do we do?". They held our hands all the way but then when it was time to step back, they stepped back."

As well as providing help and support to members of the Irish community who find themselves in difficult circumstances, the Claddagh Association also supports senior members of the Irish community and those who may be lonely and isolated. Patricia Bratton, Claddagh Treasurer (and herself a respected senior in the Irish community in WA) leads our Seniors Subcommittee. Since COVID-19 restrictions were eased in WA our Seniors events have been more popular than ever, often requiring the group to host repeat events to cater for the increased demand. This year the Seniors Subcommittee have hired a cinema for a film showing, gathered for a meal in a popular Irish venue and shared a celebratory St Patrick's Day brunch. Members of the Seniors group consistently give great feedback showing how important the group is to them, saying things like, 'We love the way you look after us' and 'Everything is so well organised and safe. It is better than any other group'

The Claddagh Association also aim to promote the well-being and development of the Irish community. We share resources and expertise with other Irish community organisations to develop the strength of our networks and build a resilient Irish community in WA. We also seek opportunities to engage and work with other Irish community organisations in welfare work and for fundraising. In March the Irish Golf Club hosted a St Patrick's Day fundraising tournament which was a great success. Twenty-seven Irish businesses sponsored the event and nearly 100 golfers and supporters turned out on the day. This community support is vital to the work of Claddagh.

Claddagh's final aim it to celebrate and preserve Irish heritage. Last year the Government of Ireland's COVID-19 Response Fund for Irish Communities Abroad part funded an oral history project with Irish Seniors in WA. Claddagh Coordinator Anne Wayne trained Claddagh volunteers and matched them with Seniors to collect the oral history of their migration journey to WA. The process enabled relationship building during COVID-19, strengthened feelings of connection to Ireland and contributed to identity building in the Irish community in WA. With support from the Australian Irish Heritage Association, we published edited excepts from the Seniors interviews in a book titled: From Home to Home: Oral Histories of Irish Seniors in Western Australia (available in digital format here: https://claddagh.org.au/claddagh-oral-history-project/). The book was launched by Honorary Irish Consul Marty Kavanagh at a celebration at the WA Maritime Museum overlooking the quay where many of the interviewees had first set foot in Australia. The complete archive of oral history interviews is a valuable historical record which was lodged at the State Library of Western Australia (SLWA) and will be housed in the SLWA Migration Voices Archive which is part of the UNESCO Australian Memory of the World Programme.

<u>The Lansdowne Club annual St</u> <u>Patrick's Day (SPD) lunch</u>

On 12 March Ambassador Ó Caollaí and Carmel were guests of the Lansdowne Club annual St Patrick's Day (SPD) lunch. The event is modestly billed as the largest SPD event in the world! This year attendance was limited to 1,164 attendees due to Covid-19.

The event was very well attended by State and Federal politicians as well as business representatives. Politicians present included the leader of the Federal opposition, Labor Party leader Anthony Albanese MP, Senator Hollie Hughes (representing PM Morrison), Hon Anthony Roberts (representing NSW Premier), the Leader of the NSW Opposition, Ms Jodie McKay, MP and Senator Deborah O'Neill.

This event was an invaluable networking opportunity with business, political, Irish community and cultural contacts present. The Ambassador was one of the seven speakers at this event. He expressed his appreciation for the efforts of the attendees to increase trade between Ireland and Australia.

He also spoke about COVID-19, lauded the frontline workers and touched on the negative impact of COVID-19 on Ireland.

He invited the guests to join him in the singing of Ireland's Call in solidarity with people of Ireland particularly challenged by COVID-19.

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A Name for Herself

On Saturday 13 March 2021 Harriet Sexton Morel attended and spoke at a play, ' A Name for Herself - Constance Markievicz' supported by the Department of Foreign Affairs. The play provided a snapshot of Constance's life, her role and subsequent imprisonment in the aftermath of the Easter Rising. It depicted the role played by Irish women more broadly in the suffragette movement. Constance Markievicz was the first woman elected to the British Parliament in 1918. She never took her seat as she was an Irish republican. The performance linked in very well with International Women's Day celebrated on 8 March.
